## FORGING FAMILY CONNECTIONS



Family Service is adamant about supporting families throughout and beyond Bucks County. It is in our name.

Throughout the year, our **Family Strengthening Programs** connect highly skilled staff with hundreds of families in the community, providing essential educational information, parenting skills, networking opportunities, special events like the annual *Family Service Community Festival* and case management. All of these offerings play a key role in keeping vulnerable families together, reunifying those which have perhaps experienced past challenges and teaching proven, evidence-based strategies to bolster family connections on every level.

Family Strengthening staff, with the assistance of dedicated volunteers, donors and partners, also manage our on-site **Food, Pet & Diaper Pantry**. The Pantry serves over 1,000 individuals each year, who are experiencing food insecurity. Best of all, many our award-winning Family Strengthening programs including the Pantry, are bilingual, thus allowing us to serve our Spanish Speaking neighbors in need.











### COMBATTING HOMELESSNESS



The plight of homelessness in Bucks County is a very well-kept secret among many. Nevertheless, it is absolutely a crisis that affects more than 500 of our neighbors each year, and that number continues to grow.

It is for this reason that the **Bucks County Emergency Homeless Shelter** in Levittown, Pa., owned and managed by
Family Service, operates at full capacity 24 hours a day, 7 days
per week, often with a waiting list that exceeds 100. More
tragic is the fact that of the approximately 350 individuals who
take temporary residency in the Shetler each year, 1/2 are
young children and a growing number of residents consist of
families, most of whom never had to previously concern
themselves with becoming unhoused.

A key component of the Shelter, beyond the fact that it is the only one of its kind in Bucks County, is that it offers residents much more than the basic necessities of three meals a day and a safe warm place to sleep. Through comprehensive case management, proactive nursing, mental health, and substance use counseling, and the availability of vital community resources, our dedicated staff, volunteers and partners aim to transition residents back to permanent housing within 60 days of admission. In the forthcoming year, plans are underway for a complete renovation of the Shelter, to support more families and provide more privacy and dignity for our residents.

Beyond the Shelter, our **Street Medicine** team spends their days traveling throughout the County in their mobile medical van, visiting more than 100 unsheltered homeless individuals, making wellness checks, preventing emergency room visits, and ensuring they are as healthy as they can be under the circumstances. The team, which consists of a registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, case manager and medical case manager have also recently added the support of physican assistants and medical students from Delaware Valley University, Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, and Doylestown Hospital.









## SUPPORTING RECOVERY & WELLNESS




A primary reason for the establishment of Family Service in 1953, was to address the growing and complex mental health problem throughout Bucks County. Since then, our agency has grown in both size and scope, now offering more than 25 programs, all of which serve the purpose of supporting the most vital needs of our community.

Outpatient Services supports and counsels over 1,600 children and adults, many of whom are experiencing serious mental health crises. Through funded programs such as Project Access, our agency successfully filled a commercial insurance coverage gap, to counsel over 100 children and youth.

In the past year, our **Community Addiction Recovery & Engagement (CARE)** Program supported Bucks County neighbors on their journey through substance misuse and recovery. By offering proactive harm reduction training and supplies, educational programming and lived-experience drug and alcohol counseling, CARE, in conjunction with our growing **Certified Peer Specialist, Street Medicine** and **Forensic** programs have served more than 1,000 over the past year.



### CREATING BRIGHTER TOMORROWS



Each year Family Service hosts a series of special events that directly and immediately benefit all of our programs and services. Additionally, we take these opportunities to highlight some of the successful outcomes that we provide for our clients.

The 12th Annual Family Service **Emergency Homeless Shelter Benefit**, which took place at Belle Voir' in Bensalem, Pa., raised more than \$210,000. The funds that were brought in, support day-to-day operating expenses and needs of Shelter residents, as they arise.

Last October, we welcomed golfers and guests to a fun and charitable day on the links at the 24th Annual **Drive for Youth Golf Outing**, which was again held at Jericho National Golf Club in New Hope, Pa. The fundraiser brought in \$50,000, all of which went towards supporting our programs and services.

Additionally, during the awards presentation, local high school student Romeo Angelini was honored with the Susan N. Altomari Champion of Youth Award, for his generous annual contributions to our Food Pantry.

For the third consecutive year, we launched our **Annual Appeal** 'virtually' via a Zoom presentation and raised approximately \$150,000 in the following month. "Joining Together for a Brighter Tomorrow" continues to be among our most unique and profitable annual fundraisers to date.











### VOLUNTEERING FOR THE GREATER GOOD



Family Service is who we are because of our dedicated and supportive volunteers. From our Board of Directors to all of our day-to-day program and event volunteers, we absolutely could not function without them.

In the past year, we were honored to have 156 of our neighbors from as far as across the bridge in New Jersey, choose to spend a portion of their time helping us assist those who need us the most. We are aware that doing so can sometimes be challenging, which makes these amazing folks all the more special.

With their help, last year Family Service provided client families in need with 250 backpacks through the Back to School Drive; 125 coats through 'Operation Warm: Driving Away the Cold'; and 500 toys and presents through the Holiday Gift Shop. These events alone are almost entirely volunteer-driven. Beyond them, our volunteers also play key roles in supporting our Food Pantry, fundraisers, community outreach and Shelter programs.

We are grateful for all that they continue to do in support of our agency. On behalf of our neighbors in need, we thank them vigorously for their assistance.
